



Compensation: Receive 63 days of pay for 39 days of participation.

When you'll serve: One weekend each month and 15 days of active duty annually. Each drill weekend or Unit Training Assembly (UTA) is equal to four days pay.

College Enrollment: As a member of the Air Force Reserve, you are automatically enrolled in the accredited **Community College of the Air Force (CCAF)** that offers associate degrees in applied science programs.

Montgomery GI Bill - Selected Reserve (MGIB-SR): For a six-year commitment with the Air Force Reserve, you'll be automatically eligible for the MGIB-SR. The MGIB-SR provides members with monthly financial assistance for college courses.

Montgomery GI Bill - Selected Reserve Kicker (MGIB-SR Kicker): An education program that provides additional monies per month to help supplement financial assistance to qualified Reserve members in certain critical career fields.

Tuition Assistance Program: After you successfully complete your college courses, you can receive 100% tuition reimbursement for undergraduate, and graduate, courses.

CLEP: The **College Level Examination Program** allows you to earn college credits by scoring a passing grade on each CLEP test. CLEP tests allow you to get college credit for what you already know and are free to Reserve members. CLEP is also available free to spouses.

College credit: You will earn college credits for the **technical training and professional military education (PME)** you receive while on the job.

Life Insurance: For a low monthly fee, you can receive from \$50,000 to \$400,000 Servicemembers' Group Life Insurance (SGLI) coverage. Each immediate family member automatically receives \$50,000 coverage at no cost.

Medical Coverage: You are authorized treatment of injuries or illnesses that occur during training periods, or while serving on Active Duty Orders. <http://www.tricare.osd.mil/reserve/reserveselect/index.cfm>

Training: 'Earn while you learn'. Keep current in your career Air Force Specialty Code (AFSC) through upgrade training. Retraining into another career field is available in most cases if you are qualified and a vacancy exists. Also, you can often select the location where you will serve.

Meals and Lodging: Reserve members eat free in the base dining facility on drill weekends. Members who live out of the commuting distance are provided with lodging during the training weekend and two-week annual tour at no cost.

Promotions: Promotions mean an increase in pay, authority, prestige, responsibilities and a bigger retirement check. You also must have the required time in grade, time in service and recommendations from your supervisor and commander.

Retirement: Retirement is based on a point system. Active duty time and Reserve time count toward the 20 years needed for a Reserve retirement. Retired Reserve members begin to receive monthly retirement checks at age 60.
